At the heart of our curriculum are the ASPIRE character virtues and learner skills which underpin our cultural capital in order for ALL our children to gain both their academic and personal potential.



Cultural Capital is one of the key ingredients a child will draw upon to be successful in society, their career and the world of work. Therefore the Cultural Capital provided within our school enables our students to have power, achieve goals and become successful educated citizens of the future with the opportunities we provide as a school.

Cultural capital is ensuring we provide children with the assets and desires to aspire and achieve social mobility whatever their starting point.

Ofsted define Cultural Capital as:

"The essential knowledge that pupils need to be educated citizens, introducing them to the best that has been thought and said, and helping to engender an appreciation of human creativity and achievement".

As a school we have continued to drive forward the variety of opportunities provided to all of our pupils both academically and personally.

Our school recognises that there are six key areas of development that are interrelated and cumulatively contribute to the sum of a child's cultural capital:

- Personal Development
- Social Development, including political and current affairs awareness
- Physical Development
- Spiritual Development
- Moral Development
- Cultural development











Personal development

- Pupil Led Lunchtime Clubs (KS1/KS2); Zones at lunchtime with playground leaders elected by the school senate.
- The school's wider pastoral framework;
- Trauma informed approach
- Growth mindset support resilience development strategies; Zones of Regulation implemented to support transition after COVID national lockdowns.
- Transition support from EYFS-KS1 and KS2 -KS3.
- Work to develop confidence e.g. role play, supporting peers;
- Activities focused on building self-esteem;
- Mental Health & well-being provision mindfulness and lunchtime provision.
- Career Education through guidance and ensuring ALL children have high aspirations.

Ofsted Voice:

Pupils at Goldsmith Academy are able to 'Dream, Rise and Aspire' because inspirational leaders are determined that pupils reach their full potential. Leaders have high expectations of all pupils. The curriculum is ambitious and enables pupils to achieve well. Leaders also use every available space in the wider school to reinforce learning, including in the early years, to inspire pupils. Pupils' personal development is exceptionally well developed. Pupils say that the school rules and values help them to become a better person and give them a sense of belonging. Pupils talk with pride about the opportunities they get to experience new challenges and meet inspirational people.

Pupils behave consistently well. They work cooperatively in class and care for each other in the playground. In the early years, children play and learn happily together. Bullying is rare and pupils know adults will deal with any incidents swiftly. Pupils feel safe at school and know that adults will listen to them if they have any problems. Relationships between adults and children are based on positivity and respect.


Personal development

Ofsted Voice:

Every pupil takes on a role or responsibility during their time at school. For example, pupils can be on the junior leadership team or school senate, are play leaders or catering assistants.

Pastoral support for pupils is effective. Staff check the mood and emotions of all pupils every day. Staff have put strategies in place to support the pupils if needed, such as 'wobble walks'. Leaders work closely with families to promote regular school attendance.












This term, Zones of regulation have been embedded to support self regulation. Playground leaders have continued to support at break and lunchtimes.
